lead site pastor's report

RON GRAY & STAFFORD GREER



This year's Lead Site Pastor's Report will be a little different than most. One reason for this difference is the fact that I am writing my portion of this report on April 8th, 2024. On this day RockPointe is a little over one month away from welcoming Stafford Greer as our new Lead Site Pastor. I am also six days from starting a Sabbatical which the Board of Elders has graciously provided for Maria and me. I know that Stafford will add his thoughts and observations to what I write, but it is my privilege to take a look back at what has transpired at RockPointe from July 1, 2023 to this date.



When I wrote the Lead Pastor Report for 2022-2023, there was a great deal of focus on the many changes that had happened at RockPointe within that year. There had been significant changes in our staffing and how our ministries and sites were structured. This was all done in order to support our sites as they sought to proclaim and live out the Gospel in their context. We were also in the midst of making significant attempts to improve accountability to, and communication with the members. It was a year of transformation.

This year's report marks a step forward as it focuses on how those changes began to have an impact on day to day ministry at RockPointe. To put it another way, the changes that were made began to be established and ingrained in the fabric of who we are and how we live and minister. As an example of this I would point to the strides forward that were made in communication regarding the finances, facilities, and staffing of RockPointe.

I want to thank the many members and adherents of RockPointe who took in the information offered to them and responded with such enthusiasm. When finances were challenging, many responded to the call and leaned into godly stewarding the resources God has entrusted to them. When the Property Stewardship Team asked for the congregation to prayerfully discern which direction God would have us go in regard to the land at Bearspaw and Westhills, many did so and provided input and encouragement that was needed. When it was communicated that a staff member was ill or that a position needed to be filled, many of you prayed earnestly that God's direction would be heard and that his will would be done. In short, I have seen in the past year a growing commitment on the part of many to be an engaged part of the body.

Some senior members of our Pastoral Staff have experienced significant health challenges this year. Dwayne Pederson and Jon Lim have needed to take time away. Please continue to pray for them as the journey is continuing. Due to their absence other staff members have had to respond by stepping into new roles; and they have done so very well. We do well to pray for and acknowledge Cherylyn Radford, Jeff Watt, Nathaniel Froese, and Todd Postlethwaite who have each stepped wholeheartedly into new roles. Ryan

Brammer deserves special thanks for the manner in which he has worked so diligently with our staff team to lead us forward. RockPointe, you can rest assured that the Staff who serves you does so with enthusiasm, energy, and excellence. Thank you to all!

RockPointe has experienced numerical growth this year. Our Bearspaw Site led the way with attendance up 25% year over year. All sites combined saw attendance rise from an average of 896 in 2022-23 to an average of 907 in 2023-24. Over 1,680 people participated in the Christmas Eve services, and Easter weekend saw over 1,690 join together to honor the death and celebrate the resurrection of Jesus.

Attendance numbers tell only a part of the story of growth. As more people gathered to worship, more people grew in their faith and followed God's call to discipleship. In 2023/24, 55 people were baptized, and 29 of those were baptized in the two months of March and April. Financially, more people began to regularly practice the discipline of giving. In 2023-24, 27 people expressed their commitment to our church family by becoming members. In many different ways God is at work calling us to follow him more closely and experience the blessing of living in obedience to him. Thank you to all who have responded to his call.

As always, the people of RockPointe responded whenever a need was presented to them. In the late days of summer \$31,700 was raised to complete a legacy project with deep



roots at RockPointe. These funds were given to provide Buzz and Myrna Maxey the resources needed to provide bibles to the people of New Guinea in their heart-language of Ngalic. The congregation at Bowridge provided 230 Bibles for the ministry of Tim and Nancy Moore in Thailand. When Casa Luz, our ministry partner in Costa Rica faced an influx of people needing care, \$16,000 was provided to enable them to do so. The Gospel has been proclaimed and those with needs have been ministered to, all for the glory of God.

I want to thank the Board of Elders for their faithful service this year. They have sought God, listened to his voice, and been obedient. To a person, they have fulfilled the scriptural mandate of an Elder. Special thanks must be given to Shauna Bygrave who has chaired the Board and provided the guidance needed over the past few years. Board members who will be coming off the Board this year are Shauna Bygrave, Lynn Cozens, Bill Thornton and Graham Wilson. Thanks to all of you for serving so very well.

If I could be granted a personal note: It has been an honor to serve as the Interim Lead Site Pastor of RockPointe Church. Thank you for the privilege, and thank you to all who prayed, encouraged, and supported me in this ministry. Thank you to Maria for standing with me, crying with me, and encouraging me on.

Most of all, thank you God for your uplifting hand, clear voice, and healing presence.

I look forward to the days ahead as I know that God intends to lead us into the amazing future he has for us. And with that; Over to you, Stafford!

Our focus on living out our mission to **Love As Jesus Loves & Live As Jesus Lives** has led us on a journey of transformation as a team, strengthening our relationships with Jesus and each other. We recognize that our church is in a period of transition, and we are laying a solid foundation for future ministry.

A significant milestone this year was **welcoming Stafford Greer to our staff team**, following dedicated prayer and effort by the Lead Pastor Search Committee and the board. We are grateful for the commitment of those involved in this process and the Search Prayer Team who faithfully supported us.

The Elder Board also embarked on **A Year of Transformation**, committing to spiritual growth through reading, coaching and additional meetings. The hopeful result will be greater joy, surrender and sustainable leadership aligned with our vision. Ask your site elders about their journey!

Our governance structure includes oversight of the **Property Stewardship Team** whose efforts have expanded notably. Here is a summary report:

The new Bearspaw roof, completed a year ago, withstood the first major storms of 2024. Praise Jesus! The project was made possible by selling 12 acres, following a discernment process with five potential buyers last fall. Excess funds helped reduce our overall debt by 50%.

In 2024, the Property Stewardship Team focused on the Westhills Discernment Team, emphasizing relationships with neighbors, developing a strong prayer team and assessing needs for our congregation and community. We're now in the Feasibility stage for a new home in SW Calgary, blessed with energetic new members who are passionate about discerning God's will and bring diverse skills and gifts.

Despite challenges such as **unexpected staff health issues**, including Jon Lim and Dwayne Pederson, we have seen resilience and adaptability within our staff team as roles were adjusted to support ongoing ministry for our church and community. We continue to pray for their recovery, our God is in the business of healing!

We extend our **gratitude to Ron Gray for his steadfast leadership** as Interim Lead Pastor during a challenging season, demonstrating wisdom and empowerment of our

This created space for

Here are some quick numbers:


- One whole book of the bible read! (Our Jr. Highs read the entire book of Romans!)

As is God's custom, he has been good to his people and this has certainly included RockPointe's young adults this year. God has provided continual growth in depth and number within our Young Adult ministries. This is evidenced in number, by the Lord providing a larger retreat than we've ever seen (doubling attendance since last year), but also some of our largest numbers in our regular Gatherings. In depth, the kinds of conversations our young adults are having have also shifted greatly from an emphasis on merely "what is true and how do I hold onto this as I navigate through university?" to "how do I radically live out the ways of Jesus in light of what he says?" which goes to show, that our young people are not merely trying to hold onto a faith that seems difficult to hold onto in our world, but are interested in engaging the world in its brokenness and providing a new way, full of hope. Along with this, our young adults are engaging deeply not just in the faith, but in RockPointe and its community, which means our young adults have continued to get baptized, they have also been a large presence at our all-sites events like Ash Wednesday, the liturgical Easter service, Good Friday, as well as





One of the important goals we have had this year since the formation of our lead team, was to increase the ownership that our young leaders feel for our young adults, and to allow for new leaders to be developed. This has certainly happened this year, as our existing leaders have been able to step into a greater sense of leadership, clarity and empowerment in young adults, but also across all of RockPointe. This has also meant that we have been able to add some new people into

leadership roles. This means we have more voices, more wisdom, and more mentorship that is happening between our young adults.

While this has been a good year for Young Adults, this is certainly the Lord's doing as this has been a challenging year on the staff side. On Nathaniel's end, his attention was largely divided between both young adults and also Westhills which was a







larger responsibility than anticipated. This ultimately led to his role change which resulted in **Meredith** being hired as the new Young Adults Associate. Transition is difficult and it can be clunky as someone steps into a new role, regardless, both Meredith and Nathaniel have benefited greatly from the leaders in Young Adults as they have both held the ministry together, as well as lived with immense grace for both Meredith and Nathaniel as their responsibilities have changed.



As we look to the future, it seems that the Lord has certainly given our people a heart for dreaming. There are ideas and hopes being born in our people to help integrate our older young adults who are often not as connected to Young Adults. There are dreams to become more connected to the wider church body, to increase mentorship between all adults and our young adults. We look forward to seeing how God brings these ideas into the life of his church.

As we look back on the past year, we are reminded of Hudson Taylor's impactful words: "God's work done in God's way will never lack God's supply." Throughout the year, we have witnessed God's unwavering faithfulness in our ministry. We have tangibly felt His presence, and His hand has been evident in everything we've undertaken; creating new life, strengthening foundations, expanding our mission, and impacting the communities which we serve.

RPI CHURCH SITE MINISTRY:

A church growing without boundaries is a dream for any senior leadership or lead pastor. It has become evident that Canada is increasingly multicultural. In response to this reality, since January



2024, we have been dedicated to bringing about a change in our church services. Rather than focusing on language-specific groups, we have been **transitioning to conducting services exclusively in English**. This transition involves ongoing communication with RPC leadership and thorough preparation of the RPI congregation for the shift to an English worship service format. This approach aims to provide a warm welcome to the new Canadians who have been participating in our weekly outreach programs. These individuals represent 29 different nations, and we aim for better integration with the rest of the RPC sites and ministries.

We are currently in the process of hiring a part-time position in Children's Ministry/Child Care Director and we are eagerly anticipating the arrival of an intern from Ambrose University in September to support our church ministry efforts.

At RockPointe Intercultural, we celebrated **six baptisms.** Each of these individuals comes from a different background, and their testimonies were incredibly powerful, serving as a true testament to the Holy Spirit and transformation. Many of these new believers are growing in their faith in Jesus through Bible study and discipleship classes we offer before our weekly worship service. To help members enhance their understanding of church culture, our sermon series this year covered various doctrinal and Biblically-themed topics.





The RPI site congregation strives to be a beacon of light in our community, and to demonstrate this we support new Canadians and refugee families through various practical ways such as the food bank referral program, helping them connect with settling services, providing immigration letters, helping them access legal and medical supports, sourcing electronics and furniture for families in need.



RockPointe Intercultural's worship service began in 2019, and since then, 98 families have walked

through our church doors, with some still attending regularly. This year, we started hosting special events and potlucks for families to get to know each other and feel a sense of belonging to the RPI community. As a result, we have seen growth in the number of service gatherings. **Our Christmas outreach event was a great success, with 270 people in attendance.** Our Christmas Day Potluck event took place at the Bearspaw site for immigrant families, many of which were separated and missing family members overseas. know it or not, there are people praying for you.

RPI OUTREACH PROGRAMS

When it comes to the health of a church, its identity and love for Christ are usually measured by its love and relationship with others. John Wesley once said, "The church changes the world not by making converts but by making disciples." The faithful volunteers at RockPointe have proven this through their sacrificial commitment to spreading the message of Jesus to the nations in Calgary.

This year, a total of 500 adults and children registered for RPI weekly programs, with weekly class attendance peaking at 110. We held winter, spring, summer and fall terms for twice weekly outreach programs, all of which concluded with potluck events to foster connections among the participants, their families and the volunteer team.





Our household and clothing giveaway events were greatly appreciated by participants' families. A huge thanks goes out to the donors and organizers for their contributions.

The structure of our ESL program this year is aligned with the Canadian Language Benchmark standards, aiming to provide high-quality lessons to students who travel from all areas

of Calgary. In addition to ESL classes, we offered sewing, guitar, cooking, and high-quality childcare. We also provided tutoring to three levelled groups

of students (grades 1-6, 7-9, 10-12) with certified teachers and qualified tutors. In addition, we added a small adolescent ESL class, which will be expanded in the fall of 2024.

Last summer, RPI hosted **a soccer camp** for youth in the Northeast, bringing together refugees,immigrants, and Muslims from 20 different nations, with an average attendance of 55 youth. We also organized a **week-long Summer Day Camp (Local Mission)** for youth with the collaboration of RPC Youth and Children Ministry, with an average attendance of 67 youth. During the outreach Summer Day Camps, the Mothers' Craft/ESL Club ran in conjunction.



At RockPointe Intercultural, we are dedicated to "Engaging People and Transforming Lives". God has been building our team, ministries, and resources to accomplish His mission in our city. We passionately work to impact the least-reached in our city with the message and love of Jesus Christ. ■

An experienced volunteer leader and former teacher, Maria brings much enthusiasm and wisdom to her role as Children's Ministry Director. We are excited about Stef and Maria joining the team!

We are excited to see the tangible ways God is moving in people's lives. One example is through prayer. Prayer was highlighted last January with a healing service where people were invited to stay for prayer at one of the stations. Praise God there were people healed! Barb Augustin reports, half a year later, that she is still healed from her chronic disease that was causing her much pain. Praise God! Another huge highlight was seeing many get baptized. Over the year 45 people were baptized and 32 of those happened in the Spring! We are so excited to see God at work!

Teams are an integral part of what happens at Bearspaw both on staff and within our volunteer ministries. We are led so well by our worship teams, our dedicated technology volunteers and those who serve in the Children's and Youth Ministry. We are thankful for the Welcome team, led by Daryl and Donnette Andresen, and the Coffee team who cares so well for everyone walking in the doors at our Sunday services. Our Intercessory Prayer Team faithfully

staffs two prayer stations every Sunday. Laurie Anne Thornton also took on the role of coordinating Small Groups. Bearspaw is powered by dedicated volunteers for whom we are thankful.

This year a "Spotlight Moment" was implemented each month. Our ministry teams each sponsored a month to recruit people to do the Scripture Readings in the service, serve Communion and host a connections event after one of the services that month. The ministry also received a "Spotlight Moment" in the service where they could speak about their ministry. It has helped the body learn more about the ministries in the church, as well as given a variety of people a chance to serve in different ways. The creativity in bringing us connection events



has been such a blessing. From pie and soup potlucks to cookies and cupcakes, many have bonded over delicious food. On Palm Sunday, there were prayer stations for people to connect with God in prayer to both praise him, intercede for others and ask for healing. The Spotlights were definitely a success!

The Stampede Breakfast, this year's Christmas production and Good Friday, were "all sites" events and services that brought everyone together. Bearspaw stepped up to serve our brothers and sisters well! Coffee Connection Morning, at Bearspaw, faithfully run by Clayton Makus, was also an important part of growing together.

55Connect, our all sites seniors ministry, continued to bless many in our community. With a dedicated leadership team, they created times monthly for people in our seniors community to gather, sing together, pray, play games, hear many inspirational stories and pray for one another. They also added serving days this year where they were able to bless others in our surrounding community helping out at Samaritan's Purse and Hope Mission. They actively live out being the hands and feet of Jesus to many of those at all of our sites.



The Bearspaw family demonstrated the generous love of Jesus in their support of our neighbors to the west of Cochrane. Through donations of diapers and formula the congregation supported young Stoney mothers and families through the Stoney Family Resource Network .The lyahrhe Nakoda Food Bank was blessed by the food donations that helped with food security for the Stoney Nations. Both organizations were so thankful for the ongoing support they have received



through our donation boxes. This year, Glen and Brenda Sine, who lead this important initiative, expanded with two donation boxes, one at each of the side entrances, where bags are also available for anyone to take if needed for themselves or for someone else. A few bags are utilized per month as part of this new Emergency Food Bag Program.

Many also grew in their relationship with Jesus through Women's & Men's Bible Studies here at Bearspaw and all site initiatives held over at Bowridge. Alpha kicked off there in the fall and was well attended, as was "Emotionally Healthy Spirituality" and "Emotionally Healthy Relationships" in the winter. Grief Share also started up in the winter. Bearspaw continued with 'Discipleship Training Modules' ('DTMs') where people gathered to learn more about Spiritual Gifts and the book of Exodus. Bowridge also offered DTM's, with



Bearspaw, in the spring offering a look at the book of Revelation and how to read the Bible. We are looking forward to many more learning and growing opportunities throughout the next year.

God is at work among us and through us. May we continue to bring him glory as we worship him and serve one another in love. ■



We are able to feed the hungry in ways that can only be attributed to God's gracious provision. Through the tireless work of the Food Security team over 200 meals a month are distributed to social agencies in Bowness to meet a very real need.





We are continuing to move towards greater connection and community amongst Bowridgians. Our connection team has planned **monthly social events** directly after services that are well attended and enjoyed. We have had lawn games and lemonade in January, three potlucks and several celebratory donut weekends. As well, two new small groups were launched this year to provide attendees with a variety of ways to connect.

Bowridge continues to be a heavily involved congregation with so many people volunteering in so many ways. From children's ministry to ESL to greeting, ushering, running the info desk,





teaching adult classes, providing coffee, working in the kitchen, driving those in need, doing behind the scenes maintenance work and so much more. Bowridge truly is a lay driven church and it is beautiful to watch the body work together.

This year has not been without its challenges. Many of our Saturday night attenders grieved the loss of the service that had been home for so many years. Even new things can bring sadness. 

• In 2024 we also established a Ministry Partnership Agreement with Greg and Linda Langman and their ministry to equip, encourage, coach and support pastors, church leaders, and church planters to dig deeper in life and leadership. Greg will do this as a certified ICF Coach and experienced organizational and church leader, and Linda will contribute to this as a trained Spiritual Director.



ADDITIONAL HIGHLIGHTS

Throughout 2023 to 2024, the GO Team was able to help coordinate support for several special projects and other needs that were brought to our attention through requests by our RPC Missionaries or our Partner Organizations. RockPointers' responded to each of these requests with incredible generosity and faithfulness.

Some of these included:

- A special request for bibles that were donated & sent to the Moore's in Thialand,
- A special collection across all sites for Casa Luz in response to local crisis in Costa Rica,
- Ongoing Yekibir Tesfa special donations for Ethiopia,
- Support to a special bible translation project in Papua, Indonesia,
- A special fund raiser to purchase a new vehicle for an IW in South America,
- Financial support to local churches in Poland to care for Ukrainian Refugees through an Alliance fund.

We also helped settle two Missionary families back to Canada with both financial support for flights and rental vehicles, but also a request to our RPC congregation to donate home furnishings and a vehicle from the RPC car ministry.

Through the ministry of Greg and Linda Langman, we are also looking forward to providing our RPC Missionaries with free access to professional coaching and spiritual direction as we move into 2025.

In 2023, RPC sites contributed a total of \$274,756 to missions through regular giving, plus an additional \$54,000 towards the special projects and donation requests mentioned above.

WORSHIP ARTS

One of the most significant changes in Worship Arts this past year involved coming into alignment with RockPointe's new site-focused model. With **Todd Postlethwaite** already active in and well-known to the young adult community at Westhills, focusing his attention on that site was a natural fit. **Jeff Watt's** multi-generational appeal and musical versatility made sense at Bowridge both in light of congregational demographics and a season during which Bowridge's volunteer base, while committed, was at a low ebb numerically. As the ministry year progressed, God's wisdom with regard to this new site-based focus became even more apparent in light of Pastors Dwayne Pederson and Jon Lim's ongoing absences, positioning Jeff and Todd to readily reallocate time and energy in order to support their sites' associate pastors.

But what about Bearspaw? In early July, **Phil Morrow** added Bearspaw Worship to his existing ministry portfolio in response to a God-implanted desire to nurture and resource the worship volunteers serving there. Phil's humble leadership soon brought a renewed sense of connectedness and vitality to the Bearspaw worship community. Alas, this sweet season was cut short by Phil's transition to Cochrane Alliance Church the following March, but God had already been preparing veteran Bearspaw worship leader **Stefan Schmitt** to step into the role in a part-time capacity. Stef and his wife Layna have long been a catalyst for healthy community among our worship volunteers at Bearspaw.

Despite their site-specific focus, Todd, Jeff and Stefan retain a highly collaborative relationship that benefits RockPointe's worship culture as a whole. For example, Todd continues to nurture what has become a firmly established (not to mention *rockin'!*) youth worship team. Several members of the youth worship team have embraced additional opportunities to serve on Sunday mornings as well.

Amid these many changes, RockPointe Worship and Creative Arts has played significant roles in a number of RockPointe-wide endeavours:

The July Stampede Breakfast incorporated an engaging service complete with a special cross-site country worship band.

The Christmas season featured an original, light-hearted drama penned by **Brandon Trotter**, *Christmas in Pleasant Valley*, performed by a talented cast of actors and musicians and featuring original music by Todd Postlethwaite. Easter included our second annual Shrove Tuesday pancake celebration and Ash Wednesday service, while Good Friday saw all RockPointe

Monthly Ascend gatherings continued to provide our church family with an opportunity to experience extended worship, prayer, testimonies and communion in a relaxed and unhurried environment.

We have been very blessed by a number of Worship Arts community events that have been hosted both at our sites as well as at the homes of some of our volunteers. There is an ever-growing desire amongst those serving in this ministry for meaningful relational connection, and by doing life together we have experienced increased freedom and joy in our gathered worship.

We are always keenly aware that none of these things takes place without a generous investment of time and energy from our **faithful volunteers** who actively partner with us in pursuing and nurturing the kind of serving environment we love to be part of. We've also been greatly encouraged to see a number of new musicians and technicians ioin our

ranks this year. Each one is evidence of God's favour and leading as new gifts, experiences and skills increase our ability to make much of Jesus. All this has placed within us a great sense of expectation for what God has in store in the year to come.

We also continue to be incredibly indebted to **Stephanie Maekelburger**, who is not only the administrative backbone of both Worship Arts and Communications, but the beating heart of them as well. COMMUNICATIONS

One of the most significant developments for Communications took place right at the beginning of the last ministry year, with the launch of our new website in early July. It immediately achieved our primary goals of reducing clicks and eliminating outdated content while providing a pleasing visual refresh. Many thanks to our friends at Iconium Media for helping us define outcomes and realize them.



Fall 2023 saw the introduction of the new congregational newsletter—a weekly email that combined our "To the Pointe" devotional and bulletin content into one attractive and easy-to-read format.

As the ministry year drew to a close, we were delighted to see an uptick in the number of stories submitted for the Hey Didja Know? segment of our weekly Community News video. We love celebrating what God is doing in our midst, and these stories have encouraged our entire church body.

The Communications Team this year has included Stephanie Maekelburger and Rachelle Bey (administration and weekly newsletter), Martine Campbell (events and social media), Brandon Trotter (announcement videos), and Jeff Watt (weekend service media and collaborative facilitator).

Finally, we would like to make special mention of our Communications "Volunteer of the Year": Manuel Reider.

Manuel, who attends our Westhills site, has blessed us with his remarkable photography skills and servant heart.

We continue to receive calls in response to our website from people desperate for our help. Yes, they say, "We hear RockPointe helps people." This is true among social workers and a variety of agencies who hear of us as well. After hearing "no" from everyone they will say we are their last resort. In response, we do what we can. And there is much that we can do thanks to the generosity of the people of RockPointe Church.

Requests are becoming more complex as deeper issues impact lives. These days accommodation is very difficult for many. They come to us requesting help with damage deposit, packing, and moving help. As an example, we received a request for help in packing up a house. In this case a mom and her three kids were about to become homeless as they had nowhere to go. We referred her to agencies that could help her precious family.

We have had many deaths and serious illness or surgeries within our RPC families over this past year. Typically, the **Compassion Acts of Kindness Team** will check on how they are doing with a **Caring Call**. Frozen meals are offered and provided by our wonderful

cooks and when appropriate their days are brightened with a bouquet of flowers. We can also provide counseling and financial support through difficult times. It should be noted that we love it when small groups step in to support each other! The Compassion Team does all we can to support small groups as they do so.

We continue to have supportive relationships with many agencies and they reach out to us often when they have no one else to turn to for help. We have the flexibility to help when they have no



other options. We partner with Bowmont Seniors, Foothills Primary Care Network, Mainsprings Pregnancy and Family Care (formerly The Pregnancy Care Centre), Discovering Choices School in Bowness, Rise Calgary, Trellis Society, Alberta Health Services, Radiance Society, Awo Taan Emergency Shelter, Berkena House and Stoney Nakoda Health Services.

Food insecurity is a huge concern for many and **Compassion works to fill the food banks at Bowmont Seniors and Discovering Choices School.** We often provide gift cards for groceries while families wait to be given access to the Calgary Food Bank.

Last Christmas we provided 96 hampers, helping 326 adults and children. We



supported 17 Yazidi families with 47 adults and 38 children being blessed. As well, Compassion supported 14 RockPointe Intercultural families including single moms, refugee families and others experiencing needs. Families, small groups and businesses chose to support those needing a lot of love at Christmas. Those who receive the hampers are overjoyed to receive them and often would not experience what so many of us take for granted at Christmas without your help.

The **Car Ministry** continues to receive many requests for vehicles. Given the current vehicle market, we continue to struggle with a lack of donated cars to help them. Vehicles are needed so that people can get to work, drive to healthcare appointments and to provide them the mobility they need in our vast city. Managing doctor appointments with a handicapped child is difficult without a vehicle. **Since 2011 the Car Ministry has been able to bless 107 individuals and families with a vehicle**. It would be hard to overstate the difference that mobility makes in the lives of these people.

Our **Rapid Response Team** supports many, many with practical help that is difficult to access these days. The talents of the volunteers who work with the RRT have repaired doors, stairs, assisted with moves and cheerfully dealt with some nasty mouse problems! Mainsprings Pregnancy, Family Care, and Radiance Society, all who help single moms and victims of violence, know that this team will be there for them when they have situations that need special love and care. Seniors too are offered the support they need to remain independent and live with dignity. Often all that is needed for this to take place is to have a ramp built or a furnace checked. The Rapid Response Team graciously does what they can.

As we look to the future we understand that God has entrusted great resources to us. In the year ahead we look forward to discovering together what God has in mind for those resources.



As always, your volunteer involvement is appreciated, and your prayer is coveted. ■

The Operations Team did a tremendous job this year bringing stability in a season of change. When it comes to facilities and operations, there are always new challenges around every corner. You will see below the members of our team, along with some things to celebrate and some areas for growth in the future.

To Celebrate

As we look at this last year, we celebrate:

- We have a great crew of volunteers who stepped in to paint, to mow the lawn, fix chairs, clean up the Westhills raw land and complete ad hoc repairs. This has been a great gift that engages our people and saves us money.
- The successful installation of the Bearspaw roof. On time and on budget. The Property Stewardship Team should be thanked for their diligent work on this; and the Operations Team in support.
- That our Capital Reserve & Replacement Fund Schedule was rebuilt (itemizing larger capital needs at all facilities, with a repair/ replace timeline, over a long term outlook). This has given us a much more accurate picture of what is needed in our budget each year to appropriately fund these needs. A ten year sloped budget strategy was prepared and approved which will see us increase funds to this CRRF each year over the next 10 years, enabling all work to be done, while retaining a minimum CRRF Fund balance of 200k.
- A brand new server has been installed, giving us greater stability and security for all sensitive information and internal documents

- A cleaning service was brought in to bring the cleanliness of our facilities to a higher standard. This has proven to be an excellent contract with visible improvements at our sites.
- Our annual budget was prepared with a 99% approval by members
- A new partnership with local restaurant
 Flores & Pine has been built, paving the way
 for corporate events at our Bearspaw site,
 increasing revenue potential through rentals.
- Brad Edwards has led the way in a full Audio Video Tech clean up and reorganization.
 This includes a much needed update of a CRRF Schedule for the AV Tech area. We have also seen our volunteer teams grow at each site in this important area.



- Negotiated a lease extension for RockPointe Intercultural at Encompass, providing another year of ministry runway.
- We were able to move together through major power outages during the winter, frozen pipes (enacting steps to ensure this does not reoccur), along with water restrictions, etc. The Operations Team did very well in response to these unforeseen events.

Focus/Growth Areas this coming Year

- We saw a significant dip in rental income this
 past year. Much of this is due to a few major
 Dance Studio's canceling their year end recitals
 due to low enrollment. Although we expect these
 partnerships to return, the onboarding of other
 partners like Flores & Pine, along with updating
 our marketing materials and strategy, should
 help significantly.
- We saw some wins in financial communication through booklets, videos and Restricted Fund video's on the Website and Newsletter, however there is still more that can be done, and done better. Work on a full financial communication strategy has been completed and will be implemented this Fall that should assist every person at RPC to understand where we sit financially, to be encouraged and thanked for the part they play and how they may be a part of our ongoing financial health.
- We repaired a large section of the South Bearspaw parking lot earlier this year.
 Core samples were completed throughout the parking lot at the same time, showing us that unfortunately there is no existing base layer underneath, explaining the rapidly deteriorating condition in all areas. This is a large capital item that will have to be carefully planned and addressed.

MARLENE ADRIAN

HOW, WHEN, AND WHERE DID YOU BECOME A CHRISTIAN? GIVE A FEW DETAILS LEADING UP TO YOUR CONVERSION.

I was raised in a Christian home. In grade one, I began attending a Bible Club in a neighbour's home. At one point, when I heard the gospel invitation, I responded to it. Over the years, I attended 5-day summer clubs and after school clubs in neighborhood homes, as well as our own home. I also went to the church down the street on Sundays and to Pioneer Girls during the week. I always wanted to be a missionary, and working with CEF gave me the opportunity to do that in Alberta, but also to train others to go around the world with the Gospel.

HOW IS GOD PRESENTLY WORKING IN YOUR LIFE?

I am focusing on becoming more conscious of His presence with me and strengthening my love relationship with Him. I have been working on a Year of Transformation with the Elders and have grown in my love for Jesus, as well as my passion to see RockPointers become transformed.

WHAT RHYTHMS DO YOU HAVE IN PLACE TO ABIDE WITH & IN JESUS (EG. PRAYER, SABBATH, FASTING, ETC.)

I am in the process of developing a rule of life, which includes spending time reading the Word and praying daily, sabbath, and I am in the process of developing a rhythm of fasting as well.

DETAILS CONCERNING YOUR COMING INTO ROCKPOINTE CHURCH:

When I moved to King's Fold Retreat Centre in 2013, I began to look for a church in the Cochrane area where I could get involved and use my giftings. When I came to RockPointe, it felt like a place to call home. I got involved in a small group right away and started helping in children's ministry that fall.

HOW, WHEN, AND WHERE DID YOU BECOME A CHRISTIAN? GIVE A FEW DETAILS LEADING UP TO YOUR CONVERSION.

By God's grace, I grew up in a Christian family. My grandfather was a pastor in Germany and he immigrated to Canada with his family in 1952 to serve at Mission Baptist Church in Winnipeg. They eventually moved to Calgary to serve at Thornhill Baptist Church. Because of my grandparents unwavering faith, I grew up surrounded by strong Christian examples. My parents were both people of prayer and exhibited servant hearts throughout my childhood.

I committed my life to the Lord at the young age of 6 and was baptized at 10. While my adolescent years brought about the usual challenges and necessary questions about who God is in my life and what sanctification in Him truly means, my faith itself has never wavered. A convicting need for a deeper personal relationship with God arose in my 30s when my mom was diagnosed with early onset dementia. Drawing nearer to Him during this time allowed me to see with much greater clarity God's continued work in my life. I learned to understand what truly listening to God - practicing listening prayer - could be like.

HOW IS GOD PRESENTLY WORKING IN YOUR LIFE?

I am a mom of three young adult children (21, 19, 17). This role is where I find God working most deliberately during this stage of my life. I recognize Him growing in me a desire to have conversations that impact their future identities, encourage them to be prayerful in their decision-making processes, and invite their friends into our household in meaningful ways. I am also consistently in prayer for them as I learn to "let go" of my control in their lives and see them venture away from home. I am finding this to be a challenging stage of life but also one that God is actively using me in.

WHAT RHYTHMS DO YOU HAVE IN PLACE TO ABIDE WITH & IN JESUS (EG. PRAYER, SABBATH, FASTING, ETC.)?

My prayer life is something I rely on daily to ground myself in what God would have for me that day. He is the One who guides me and accompanies me as I walk through a typical day. It is my greatest comfort to know that He is always with me.

I also have times of deeper, more intentional reflection and meditation most days. My greatest times of listening to God and hearing His voice happen on my daily walks. During these walks, I also listen to sermons and Christian podcasts as a way to learn, reflect, and consider the process of discipleship on my life.

Reading the Bible is something I do (almost) every morning by using the Bible Recap. I appreciate the contextualizing that is provided. This allows me to feel grounded in the Word daily while also seeing it in new ways year-after-year.

DETAILS CONCERNING YOUR COMING INTO ROCKPOINTE CHURCH:

Our family began attending RockPointe regularly in September 2014, although I had been attending the Wednesday morning women's bible studies for a period of time before that. Jeff and I were members at Thornhill Baptist Church, where we both attended since we were born. The move to RockPointe was prompted by numerous factors:

1. God's prompting: We felt God was calling us to make this change. RockPointe was a place we were often drawn to (for women's Bible studies, because some of our family attend here, etc.) so it seemed that God was intentionally putting the church in our path. Often, during services, we would hear God speak to us and feel the Spirit clearly moving in our lives. It was an act of trust and obedience to switch churches.

I am married to Jeff (25 years!) and we have three children (Caitlin, 21, Lucas, 19, and Daniel, 17). I have a BEd and BA (English) and taught as a high school English teacher for many years. I currently work full-time as a guidance counsellor at Chinook Learning Services located in Forest Lawn (an upgrading high school in the CBE). I try to stay active and enjoy hiking, walking, and pickle ball. I also enjoy reading, listening to podcasts, and spending time with close friends and family.

BEV ROSS

HOW, WHEN, AND WHERE DID YOU BECOME A CHRISTIAN? GIVE A FEW DETAILS LEADING UP TO YOUR CONVERSION.

I had the privilege of being raised in a Christian home. My mother led me to the Lord as a child and challenged me in my spiritual growth. My parents made a consistent effort to make sure that we were exposed to strong Biblical teaching. Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, youth groups, special meetings, church choirs and church bands filled our lives and helped us to develop close friends who were of like mind and heart. As a result, I grew up with a strong group of Christian friends in a strong Bible-centered church.

As I grew older, I sensed God's direction and God's call to commit my life to Him consistently and wholeheartedly. I sensed God's call to baptism when I was 12 and clearly remember that most significant day. When I was 15, I was deeply challenged by God to commit my life to full-time ministry and felt that call deepen as I got older.

After much prayer and exploration, I applied to Canadian Bible College (CBC) in Regina, to begin a degree in Christian ministry. I was very excited to be accepted. But in July of the year that I was to start, my mother suddenly passed away of cancer. With the encouragement of my church friends and family and after much prayer, I decided to defer the start of my degree so that I could stay home with my family. This happened just before my 19th birthday and my three brothers were 12-17. It was a very difficult and emotionally stressful time for all of us. But I can clearly recall God speaking to me during that time and teaching me.

I did end up going to CBC, finished my degree there, met Cal and got married and then we headed into ministry. Cal served as a pastor at Trailview Alliance Church in Swift Current, SK and then we headed back to Regina where Cal completed his graduate education. In 1985, Cal and I, along with two of our sons, headed to Costa Rica for Spanish language study and then on

to Ecuador and Chile as International Workers with the Alliance. Our daughter and youngest son were born during that time. We spent 10 years in church planting and church development.

After our time overseas, we decided to stay in Regina. I worked at the University of Regina for thirteen years, followed by a move to Calgary in 2008 and ten years at Ambrose University.

HOW IS GOD PRESENTLY WORKING IN MY LIFE?

God has been challenging me to further growth in my prayer life and specifically in listening for His voice, to being still. He has guided me to Scriptures and devotionals that have challenged my thinking. He has reminded me to listen to those around me; to stay alert to what their needs and concerns are.

1. Welcome and Song of Worship

Phil Morrow, Bearspaw Youth and Worship Pastor, opened the with a song of worship.

The AGM was preceded by an information session at 6:00 PM for a detailed review of the 2022 - 2023 Financial Summary.

6. Elders Board Report - Shauna Bygrave & Dean Leischner

6.1 Looking Back: Focus, Trust, Board Role

There were 2 things that were needed last year to keep moving forward. The first was FOCUS on Jesus. Focus - Matt 5:4 - When we reflect on the last year, we need to remember the hard things we walked through as a church family. We mourned. We said good-bye to deeply loved staff members, congregational members, and faced headwinds related to the health of our congregation and finances. At times we were discouraged, however God continued to show us that He was with us, would provide for us and would guide us as we allowed Him to lead.

Shauna's journey: starting June 2022 found herself struggling to process where God had placed her. She found she needed help and Jesus in a deeper way than she had experienced before and needed to allow Him to love her in a way she hadn't allowed before. Amongst dealing with past wounds, her sin, shame, resentments and the challenges happening at RockPointe, she somehow managed to keep her focus on Jesus and testifies to Jesus' healing and transforming power.

Trust - to keep moving forward we need Trust - transformation happens with full trust (not half trust but the willingness to take a running leap over the edge type of trust) Jeremiah 17:5 says "Cursed are those who put their trust in mere humans, who rely on human strength and turn their hearts away from the Lord." And then in verse 7, "But blessed are those who trust in the Lord and have made the Lord their hope and confidence."

Role of the Board - With the transitions we have been through over the last couple of years the role of the board was more fluid than usual. We are, however, clearly re-defining the roles on the board and have also clearly articulated accountabilities between board and staff. In short, the board is there to DIRECT & PROTECT. The role of direction is to work collaboratively to define our mission, vision and values which informs our Directional Plan. This work is typically done annually at our January retreat.

As a part of the role of protection we have re-established accountability structures such as an annual 360 review for the Lead Site Pastor role, an annual board survey, as well as a congregational survey.

6.2 Looking Forward: MVV, LPSC, Blessing

Mission, Vision, Values - it's good to be looking forward, especially when the view is good. The Elder Board and Staff are carrying the mission and vision. What does it mean to be a church on mission? Our mission is to love like Jesus loves. Jesus loved the downtrodden, he hung out with the outcasts, he was in close proximity to those in poverty. He welcomed the sinner and the insignificant. It can be a challenge in our current culture to live more like Jesus and love more like Jesus, but it is possible. Romans 8:28.

One of the ways we can live more like Jesus lived is to follow His habits and engage in the spiritual disciplines Jesus engaged in such as prayer and fasting. If you are interested in growing in these areas, we'd invite you to reach out to a Christian brother or sister and do this together. We hope and pray that over time our commitment, and your commitment, to living counter culturally and being in the presence of God will permeate throughout our entire church and our communities.

What does this mean going forward? It means we can have hope! If we are living like Jesus lived we will be a church focussed on what Jesus would have us focus on. A church that is radically different from the world around us. We will ask different questions and our priorities will shift. We do church not for the purpose of coming on a Sunday morning but for the purpose of sharing God's love with each other.

LPSC - As of today, the Lead Site Pastor position has been posted and the search committee is reviewing applications. The posting can be found on our website. The next steps will be to conduct initial screening interviews, followed by more in-depth interviews and reference checks. The final candidate will be recommended to the board in December with candidating hopefully happening in January.

Of note, the LPSC has scheduled a congregational meeting on Sunday, November 12th at 7pm at Bowridge. The objective of the meeting will be to share further information related to the search, allow the committee to hear from the congregation, and enter into a time of prayer together. We hope you are able to join us.

Blessing - In conclusion, we would like to thank each member of the current elders board, and also say a special thank you to those concluding their service tonight. We are going to share some words of affirmation for our departing board members. This is something we take time as a board to do on occasion throughout the year:

7.2 Bearspaw Roof

We needed a roof, so we started with prayer and discernment and it is now complete! The project was approved with a budget of \$800,000 plus contingency. The project was closed on budget and no Change Orders. However, a small contingency will be needed for some drywall repair due to water damage as well as asphalt damage due to heat. Ryan Brammer is working on a project to repair these items and finish the work. Special thanks to Jim for his oversight on the project.

How are we going to pay for the roof? (see below).

7.3 Bearspaw Land Sale

Last year, approval was received from the congregation to sell the Bearspaw Land. Two offers came in: first fell through, while second offer needed time for rezoning and the conditions were not met in September so the offer has been taken back. Here is a reminder that things happen in God's time. As of September, the land is back up for sale; 4 offers have come through and will be put before the Elders Board for prayer, discernment and time to listen to Holy Spirit to direct our paths as we move forward.

7.4 Westhills Lease

When the Westhills congregation was asked "What do you want?", what we heard was a need for a home in South West Calgary. Although not there yet, commitment is to find a solution because we know we as RockPointe need to have a home in SW Calgary.

The Westhills site has been meeting at Ambrose for 15 years and in August 2023, the current lease expired. The renewal of the lease introduced new storage constraints as Ambrose needed to meet some of their own operating needs. After prayer and further discussions we were able to find a workable solution however note future agreements at Ambrose will place further constraints around our storage and setup. Special thanks to Nathaniel for putting together a team to do the set up and Ryan for the hard work of negotiations.

7.5 Westhills Rezoning

RockPointe currently owns 5 acres on the corner of 77th Street and 17th Avenue SW. The current zoning does not allow for multi-use development, and it happens RockPointe is the only one without it in that area and part of the Area Structure Plan .

The process to rezone our property started in 2019 with TRICO as a partner. By July 2020, the property was still not rezoned due in large part to COVID and its restrictions.

In May 2021, a second attempt was made to rezone with a new company (Round Hill). At this time, we were met with unsuccessful attempts to meet with City Planners. In 2022 an access road was also deemed to be required off of 77 street onto the adjoining property so the team spent 9 months working on 8 agreements to get the road built. As such, the rezoning application did not go to the City until spring of 2023. Since then, a number of discussions have been had but we still do not have rezoning in place after having spent over \$200,000.

In September 2023, when the money was spent and the land was not rezoned, a decision was made by the Elders Board to pause, refocus, pray, and discern before moving forward again. A dedicated PST team was put together to figure out how to get a RockPointe home in South West Calgary and what would this look like (i.e. build a Church?; sell the land; develop the land; enter into some sort of partnership; obtain/buy another Church or some other building?).



The PST and Elders Board asks the congregation to cover the discernment process in prayer.

No, dear brothers and sisters, I have not achieved it, but I focus on this one thing: Forgetting the past and looking forward to what lies ahead, Philippians 3:13

8. Treasurer's Report - Richard Kruger, Treasurer

Richard introduced the Finance Team members: Irene Huisman, Ryan Brammer, Ron Kinniburgh, Bob Marescaux, Wayne Wright, Brett Dietterle, and Emy Wilson.

Richard presented the 2022-23 Financial Report, provided a summary and highlights of the financial review, and provided an overview of the fund balances.

Financial overview

- Total Revenue down from 2022 but higher than budget
- Total Expenses down from 2022 due to lower personnel cost, but about \$200K over budget due to end of employment and summer student costs (not budgeted)

Allocation of all Funds - 70% ministry, 20% restricted, 9% capital. Donations account for 87% of our revenue. 53% of expenses are for Personnel, close to the target for 50% set by the EB.

Donors are RockPointe's primary source of revenue. Over the past 6 fiscal periods, donations and donors have decreased: 40% decrease in donors but donation amount line has flattened meaning remaining donors have stepped up. There was a 6% decrease in the number of donors year over year.

Richard provided Ministry Fund and Restricted Fund updates (of note: Development Fund deficit due to Bearspaw Roof project) and concluded with a Year-To-Date Financial Update - deficits have caused a draw down on our cash balance (now down to \$180K).

On the motion duly moved, it was resolved to approve the unaudited financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2023 with the review engagement report attached as presented to the members.

Motion was carried.

9. Voting Results – Shauna Bygrave

The results of the online ballot voting for Elders, Nominating Committee, and Tellers were reported to the Chair by the Head Teller. All nominees received a favorable vote of greater than 50% plus 1 of the ballots cast.

Shauna invited the three new Elders (Bob, Ken, Troy) to come forward to be prayed for by Jim Postlethwaite. Troy was unable to attend due to a business trip, his wife Tonya came to the front.

10. Question and Answer Session – Shauna Bygrave and other Elders

Question: What happens to Ron if he does not accept LSP?

Response: Since we are part of the C&MA we must follow the LSP process. The District has secondary responsibility over the LSP. Clarified LSP role, 'first among equals'. Nov 12 update to come, not much more to be said while we are in the middle of the process.

Question: What can't we just make Ron the LSP?

Response: Ron has served RockPointe sacrificially during the past months and has set us up for a successful search for our new lead pastor. The Christian & Missionary Alliance has a process for determining the next lead pastor for a church such as RockPointe. This process includes a public posting process that is now underway which allows interested candidates, both internal to the church and external, to express their interest in filling this role. If God moves Ron to put his name forward in this process, he will be strongly considered for many reasons.

Question: Compassion Fund Balance - what is the church's plan to address this?

Response: Take to prayer to seek God's face. While we could easily spend the dollars \$150 at a time, Ron feels there could be something significant this large amount could be designed for.

Comment: What can we do to encourage people to come in the front door?

Response: Leadership team to bring people in, congregation to step into it.

Question: Communications need

Response: Board and Lead Team addressing communications needs, Nov 12 and 19 as an example and other future town halls.

Question: What are leadership and staff doing about congregants feeling siloed? There is a need for an outlet for communications (e.g. BP and BW doing things, WH does not know about it and the challenge of not having a building); What about no females on the current Lead Team?

Response: Collaboration across sites will rest with associate pastors' roles to help things like this; Ashley Issler has received some coaching and is stepping into a leadership role for female staff to go to.

Question: How do I know what fund to choose to give to?

Response: Over the last 3-4 weeks, there's been weekly communications on the different funds in the services, the discipline of tithing and the church's financial position. We can include some additional information about the various funds and their position in our weekly newsletter.

Report of the Tellers

The Membership of RockPointe Church recently conducted an online ballot through Simply Voting regarding the following motions presented to membership:

A total of <u>226</u> of a possible <u>376</u> ballots were received. We need a total of <u>124</u> ballots to establish a quorum.

Motion #1:

I approve the Ministry Fund balanced budget which includes revenue of \$2,842,000 and expenses of \$2,842,000 for the 2024/25 fiscal year.

We received <u>216</u> ballots in favor of the motion, <u>2</u> against and <u>8</u> abstained. This motion requires a simple majority support of all ballots in order to be approved. The actual support achieved on this vote was <u>99.1</u> percent of valid ballots cast. Therefore the motion is carried.

Motion #2:

I approve the Missions, Compassion, Development, and New Venture Fund targets for the 2024/25 fiscal year.

We received $\underline{218}$ ballots in favor of the motion, $\underline{2}$ against and $\underline{6}$ abstained. This motion requires a simple majority support of all ballots in order to be approved. The actual support achieved on this vote was $\underline{99.1}$ percent of valid ballots cast. Therefore the motion is carried.
